2024 saw 44 sailors complete our Challenges this past summer. Six sailors completed both the Port Huron to Mackinac and the Lake Erie Challenges. Blair Arden, Joey Baker, Noel Brockman, Russ Krock, Lease Shock and Ben Thorsen.

Change in Vessel Tracking

The following change was voted on and approved by the GLSS membership.

CURRENT REQUIREMENT DELETED

29. A Spot or other Messaging and Tracking device using satellite communications capable of sending a manual "OK" signal and set to a ping rate of no less than every 30 minutes. It must be turned on and transmitting for the entirety of the event.

<u>NEW REQUIREMENT</u> ADDED

The GLSS Board of Directors will require individual vessel tracking for all boats on all Challenges with the equipment and operational requirements to be given in the Notice of Race (NOR) and Sailing Instructions (SI).

Rational

Making these changes allows the Board of Directors to be flexible in providing race tracking and safety aspects of a vessel tracker with changing technology. This is similar with how other events are addressing this requirement.

Currently the best option is the Yellowbrick system which is also used in the LO300 and TransSupior events

Financial

The 2024 season was another great sailing season for the GLSS and a profitable one for the coffers. Continuing our efforts to remain responsible to our members on the fiscal side of running our Challenges we had a \$1580.87 profit for the year. Quite remarkable considering we ran so many events this past year. And our most expensive Challenge came in with a strong profit. The GLSS BOD continues to stress the importance of keeping costs low.


Ralph Eilberg Award for Outstanding Seamanship John Hoskins

Ralph Eiliberg was one of the Founding Fathers, Charter Member and past President of the GLSS. A top ten collegiate marathon runner, one of Ralph's greatest loves was sailing. Ralph also established the Port Huron to Chicago Solo



Challenge in 1981. The Super Mac, as it is known, is the second longest freshwater solo sailing venue in the world only superseded by the solo Super Mac and Back established in 2008.

John was nominated for his rescue of a sailor who fell overboard during the 2024 Crewed Chicago to Mackinac Race. The rescue took place in total darkness requiring John's leadership, crew preparation and modern technology. The rescue was accomplished very quickly. Because conditions were rough, great skill was needed once the sailor was spotted to get him onboard. All the sailors on John's boat knew their jobs and performed them flawlessly. The ability to get into position and recover the sailor depend on a crew trained and practiced for spotting and safely maneuvering the boat into position. During his acceptance, John greatly praised his crew for their dedication and ability to follow job responsibilities for the rescue.

Water Level Updated 3/21/25

There have been significant changes to the Great Lakes water levels over the past few years. From being at or near all-time high water levels we are now at much lower water levels. Currently Lake Superior is below Chart Datum with the projected change by Apr 21 still below Chart Datum. All sailors need to be aware of water levels they will be sailing through.

ALERTS

Water levels shown are still-water surface elevations over the entire lake surface. Water levels at specific locations may differ due to meteorological influences. Official records are based on monthly average water levels and not daily water levels. Great Lakes, connecting channels, and St. Lawrence River users should keep informed of current conditions before undertaking any activities affected by changing water levels. Mariners should use navigation charts and refer to current water level readings. Find ice information at National Ice Center's website.
